

## **Barbara Barron-Wilcox**

We are saddened to report the untimely death of our long time member and friend, Barbara Barron-Wilcox, on August 5. Barbara was currently serving as the Vice President of the Historical Society. She and her mom, Crystal Booth, were both stalwart Lincoln Park community and museum supporters over these many years. Barbara's health had been up and down since surgery in January and made a turn for the worse in recent weeks.

Barbe grew up in Lincoln Park, graduating from LP High School in 1949, married, had two sons, Dan and Brian. She lived away from the area for a time, and returned to teach Theater at the High School through the 60s and 70s. Theater and Music were in her blood. In addition to teaching, she has been employed as an actor, role player and presenter at Greenfield Village for over 25 years, and has been singing with a local Sweet Adelines chorus. Barbe was 79. Her passing is a shock to us all; we will greatly miss her and her many gifts.

#### **RECENT ACQUISITIONS**

We have had many acquisitions recently, more than we can list. Among them is a 14" fur dream catcher from **Virginia Pieratt**, plus china doll frames of Abe and Mary Todd Lincoln. We acquired a 20's era spindle wood clothes dryer frame from **Juliann Bademian**, a cast iron waffle iron that fits over open flame, and a car phone from the early 90s to add to our historical telephone exhibit. On loan to us from Virginia Pieratt are a canvas oil painting of her Indian grandmother, the son, and young granddaughter, Virginia.

We have received from the Yatchman family a collection of art works of **Ruth Yatchman**, who passed away earlier this year at the age of 83. Ruth's talent and skill will be remembered by many of our community for her creative paintings on china and porcelain. Over the years, she painted, traveled, and lectured throughout the Midwestern states. Her pieces became highly valued for quality and color.

Early in her career she collaborated with local artist, Crystal Booth, in painting on copper.

We are extremely grateful to her daughter, Michelle, who lives in Seattle, for the generous donation. Along with the art work, we received a file of news items photographs and pertaining to Ruth's artistic pursuits.

## Lincoln Park at 90 ReCap

On Sunday afternoon, the Recognition Ceremony at Memorial Park honored our residents who are celebrating a 90<sup>th</sup> birthday during this anniversary year. It was heartening to see many of them together on the stage of the band shell. Certificates were also bestowed on the many (over 30!) long-time Lincoln Park businesses who have served the community faithfully for 50 years or more.

On hand to assist with presentation of certificates were Commissioner, and LP resident, Ilona Varga and her staff, U.S. Congressman Hansen Clarke of the 13<sup>th</sup> District, State Senator Hoon-Yung Hopgood, and State Representative Paul Clemente. Lincoln Park received proclamations of recognition from the Wayne County Commission, the Senate and House of the State of Michigan, and from the U.S. Congress — and our neighbor the city of Southgate. These Proclamations are all currently on view at City Hall.
