This 1959 photo came to us from the Fire Department archives, courtesy of **Chief James Lees**, who provided the caption

"Friday night, July 24, 1959. Sears Water Ball Fight – Lincoln Park Fire Department vs. River Rouge Fire Department. At least two-thirds of an estimated 4,000 spectators were soaked while watching the nocturnal game in the Sears Shopping Plaza parking lot. Chief Thomas C. Dickson can be seen clearly in the center of the picture wearing the white dress hat, in addition to members of the River Rouge FD on the left and Lincoln Park FD positioned on the right. The battle ended in a 1-1 deadlock after 50 minutes of intense water play, as part of the annual "Lincoln Park Days" celebration."

LINCOLN PARK at 90 HERITAGE FESTIVAL

Coming JUNE 24-26, 2011

LINCOLN DARK PREPS FOR 90th BIRTHDAY!

On June 28 of this year, Lincoln Park will celebrate its 90th birthday. The Village of LP was chartered on that date in 1921. Less than four years later the residents of LP would vote to become a city, one of the fastest growing communities in Michigan at the time.

A volunteer committee of representatives from LP organizations has been working together in preparation for a fun and memorable celebration to be held this summer. The festivities will center on the weekend of June 24, 25 and 26.

Plans include:

A celebration open house and carnival located at the civic center area near Southfield Road and Fort Street, one of the oldest intersections in the downriver area.

A LP schools-wide contest held for a logo design for the 90th Heritage Festival.

We expect that "open houses" will be scheduled at the Fire Station, Police Station, City Hall and Library, as well as the Historical Museum.

An exhibit at the museum will showcase LP and its civic leaders in the early 1920s, and our evolving relationship to Detroit and surrounding communities. Included in the exhibit will be a historic timeline showing LP's rapid growth.

A tentative schedule for the weekend follows: Friday, June 24 evening – Opening Public Reception for the Museum exhibit on LP's founding.

Saturday, June 25 day time (also Cruisin' Downriver day): Open houses throughout the Civic Center area, vendors, food, and street entertainment

Saturday, June 25 evening: live entertainment at the Band Shell. Memorial Park

Sunday, June 26, Special Farmers Market activities during the day; a formal Commemoration and Recognition Ceremony at 4:00 p.m.
