

NEW HISTORICAL MARKER

We are delighted to report that on January 9, 2013 the Michigan Historical Commission formally approved Lincoln Park's application for a State of Michigan Historical Site designation for the Pontiac Council at Council Point along the Ecorse River. The application was submitted in June upon a Resolution of the City Council in support of the historical marker. The marker has been ordered and delivery will take place before the official dedication on Saturday April 27 at Council Point as part of the Council's 250th Anniversary ceremony. We are seeking contributions to help pay for the cost of the marker: Members and friends, please see the enclosed letter and form with your newsletter. We welcome contributions from anyone who wishes to support this project. All contributors will be recognized on a permanent list of names posted on the wall of the Museum along with a photo of the new marker taken at its dedication. LECTURE: "Chief Pontiac's Council- 250th Anniversary Commemoration" This power point program will serve as a prelude to the upcoming April 27th commemoration of Pontiac's War Council. Presentation by curator Jeff Day at the Museum.

Commemoration of Chief Pontiac's Council, held at Council Point Park — Organized by the American Indian Movement — Michigan Chapter (AIM-Mi), with support from the LP Historical Museum and the City of Lincoln Park, the commemoration will feature a weekend Pow Wow on April 26 to 28. At 5:00 P.M. on the 27th the council ceremony will be held, and will include the dedication of the new State of Michigan Historical Site Marker. Many representatives of Great Lakes tribal communities, officials of the Michigan Historical Commission, and other dignitaries and government officials will be in attendance.

During the week of April 22 to 26, daytime educational events at the park will be reserved for local school classes, with *public events*, including concerts, being planned for each evening – all programs will be held at the park location. We welcome Tom Karnes, retired Chief of Police, as the newest Commissioner on the LP Historical Commission. Tom's appointment was approved by City Council in November, 2012. Welcome aboard, Tom!

We extend our deepest sympathies to their families and friends.

The December Holiday Open House was a great success – our first time having it on a Saturday evening, in conjunction with the City of LP's tree lighting ceremony. The annual event promises to be bigger and better next year, with the combined efforts of the Mayor's office, the Downtown Development Authority, led by Madhu Oberoi, and the Historical Society.

Jeff makes the rounds: In addition to the April museum program, curator Jeff Day will be participating in the Historical Society of Michigan's Local History Conference on March 22 in Livonia. He will be one of three presenters speaking on the upcoming 250th Anniversary of the Pontiac Uprising, along with Eric Hemenway, historian and Director of Repatriation with the Little Traverse Bay Band of Odawa, and Craig Wilson, Museum Historian with the Mackinac State Historic Parks. On February 6, Jeff will speak to the Exchange Club here in Lincoln Park on the plans for the Pontiac anniversary.
