april 25th annual dinner BILL MORRISON SPEAKER


Artist Bill Morrison will be our featured speaker at the Historical Society annual dinner this year, held on Thursday, April 25th. Bill grew up in Lincoln Park and graduated in the Lincoln Park High School Class of 1977. He began his career in Detroit as a technical illustrator, but when Bill decided he had rendered his last diesel fuel pump, he moved to Southern California with his wife, Kayre.

He began working immediately in motion picture advertising and painted dozens of movie posters, including many for Walt Disney Pictures, such as *The Little Mermaid, Bambi, Peter Pan, Cinderella,* and *The Jungle Book.*

In addition to his work on *The Simpsons* and *Futurama*, Bill has written and drawn his own comic book series; the four-time Eisner Award-nominated *Roswell*, *Little Green Man* and co-created two other comic book series, *Heroes Anonymous* and *Lady Robotika* (the latter with Jane Wiedlin of the legendary all-girl rock band, The Go-Go's). Bill is a past President of the National Cartoonists Society and former managing editor of *Mad Magazine*. He and Kayre currently reside in St. Clair Shores.

In 2016, Lincoln Park honored Bill with the "Key to The City" at the museum's career retrospective. Then-Mayor Tom Karnes stated, "Bill's talents were renowned in Mixter Elementary and Huff Junior High School before they were shared with the world. He left his mark as a great artist while retaining hometown values. He is a true Lincoln Parker."

In 2021, Bill created the illustration 'Made in Lincoln Park' to honor the 100-year anniversary of the incorporation of the Village of Lincoln Park; his design featured many seminal figures who left their mark on American culture over the century. 313-386-3137 1335 Southfield Rd, Lincoln Park, MI 48146 Museum Hours: Wednesday & Saturday 1 pm to 6 pm

Building Preservation Grants Sought

The Tom Roberts Architectural (TRA) building assessment of the museum/historic post office building - the first conducted in some thirty years - was submitted to the Lincoln Park Historical Commission last fall and in January a study session was held to discuss the report and its recommendations. Major issues for the building involve the north façade, where the main entrance to the 85-year old building has been slowly dealing with structural brick and stone issues, limestone, granite, and concrete; mortar joints; iron railings; window trim; and chimney and roofing issues. The Commission has begun the process of reviewing grant possibilities to help with these matters. We will keep you posted about any developments.

Wednesday, April 3rd 7:00 P.M. "Clara – The Believer"

Will serve as a follow-up to the Henry Ford Heritage Association's presentation here last fall on Henry Ford the man. In April, we will hear the story of **Clara Bryant Ford** from HFHA's Mark Campbell and Ruth Gatza.

Henry Ford was an automotive and business icon, but at home Clara was both head of the household and his most cherished advisor. Henry said many times, "The greatest day in my life is when I married Mrs. Ford."

In addition to her steadfast support of her husband's endeavors, Clara Bryant Ford was influential at pivotal points in the history of the Ford Motor Company and was instrumental in their philanthropic efforts like the Henry Ford Hospital.

You will also learn about Clara's love of gardening, family, and the charities she supported in her lifetime. The program is at 7:00 p.m. at the museum and is open to the public; there is no charge to attend.

Wednesday, May 8th 7:00 P.M. "The Underground Railroad in Detroit"

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On Wednesday May 8 at 7:00 p.m. author Karen Risko will present her talk entitled "The Incredible Journey to Midnight" on the history of The Underground Railroad in Detroit; MIDNIGHT, the final juncture before freedom, was the code name for Detroit.

Karin operates City Tour Detroit; among her offerings are walking tours that lead participants along two miles of the path freedom seekers took. A former schoolteacher, Karin has a Major in History from Central Michigan University, and has written two books about local history, "Michigan Civil War Landmarks", and a "History Lovers Guide to Detroit". In addition to the above spring programs, on Wednesday March 13th, at 7:00 p.m. curator Jeff Day will review with us some of the milestones that occurred in 1924 as the flourishing community headed toward a vote for cityhood in January of 1925.

1924 - A Decisive Year

When we look at early Lincoln Park history, we usually think about two years in particular: 1921 and 1925 – the former the year the community of several hundred voted to incorporate as a rural Village, and the latter year, which introduced a vigorous, reincorporated city of over 9,000, supported by thriving businesses, schools and churches. The centennial anniversaries of these two years coming just four years apart rightly warrant a community's celebrations.

In between, our population had grown to accommodate the demand for labor in the everincreasing industrial economy centered at Detroit. Issues of housing and real estate, commercial and municipal development came to dominate the local conversation and governmental action; topics of water and sewers and roads very likely took precedence over the 1924 U.S. presidential election.

Those intervening years require a closer look. Having crossed into 2024, we can take this time this year - to look back one hundred years to Lincoln Park's most active growth spurt just prior to its citizens' vote for cityhood.

The museum will be using our Facebook page to post many of these stories and will share them on our website through the coming year. A special newsletter issued in the fall will look at 1924 and the run-up to the city's centennial commemoration next year.
