The photo below shows Lincoln Park Memorial Day Parade festivities from the early 1930s with local veterans of the First World War participating. The parade marched south along the west side of Fort. The buildings seen are on the east side of the street; Kelly Furniture, at right, stood at 1657 near where the Mellus Newspapers building was later situated. Median parking along Fort Street lasted from the 1930s to the early 1970s.

Famed auto racer Ralph DePalma (1882-1956), below, was caught in the village of Lincoln Park in the dead of night -- one hundred years ago! (The short news item shown appeared in the *Lincoln Park News* of July 26, 1923; from the museum's collections.)

In 1923, DePalma, one of the most successful auto racers in the pioneering years of racing, established the DePalma Manufacturing Company in Detroit to build race cars and engines for automobiles and aircraft. It was not a lasting enterprise and reasons for its lack of success are unclear. Even so, the famous racer obviously made an impression on Lincoln Park's finest.



Ralph DePalma, famous auto racer, received quite a surprise this week while speeding through the village at 2:00 A. M. on his way to Toledo. Not knowing the road, he drove straight ahead at the Champagne road turn and landed in a pile of bricks on the Lincolnshire Subdivision.
