"THE KID", which opened in February of 1921, was the first feature film from Charlie Chaplin, who went on to make classics 'The Gold Rush', 'City Lights' and 'Modern Times'. We selected this film because it was released during the year that the village of Lincoln Park was founded. Silent movies were a big draw by the 1920s, and nearly every community had a movie theater. Lincoln Park would build its first, and only, theater - The Park Theater - in 1925, the year we became a city. (Films with sound, using various technologies, began to appear in 1927.) Silent movies were typically accompanied by live piano or organ music. This version of 'The Kid' features a music score composed by Chaplin that was added for later releases of the film.

We will be showing "**The Kid**" – a family friendly film running about 70 minutes in length - at the museum on Saturday, December 17 at 4:00 P.M. -- accompanied by a 'Felix the Cat' cartoon, of course. There is No Charge.


