

MAX SCHIEBOLD: PUBLIC SERVANT

Max Schiebold's political career began when, as a young husband and father, he was appointed to the Lincoln Park Planning Commission in 1955. chaired the commission for five years, during which time the city entered into a major urban renewal project on Fort Street, became home to a stretch of the new Seaway Freeway (I-75), and continued its development of major business and shopping hubs, including the Lincoln Park Plaza and the Sears Shopping Center.

He was first elected to the city council in 1963 and

served as its president for six vears. His two terms as mayor, from 1971 to 1975 capped a noteworthy career in city politics but it didn't end there. As many know, Max would remain devoted to the city in the ensuing decades and served in a number of capacities after leaving public office. It is his extensive legacy of service,



when the Scheibold family arrived at Ellis Island from Dresden, Germany in 1926 [see photo below] that we are honoring with a special exhibit of personal and political memorabilia along with a number of family photographs. The exhibit is currently on display through November 15.

On Saturday, November 8^{th,} the Scheibold family will attend a public reception held at the museum beginning at 2:00 p.m. Please join us if you can.





2015 is in view

As we approach the new year, plans are being made to celebrate the city of Lincoln Park's 90th birthday in 2015. Many will recall that Lincoln Park celebrated the 90th anniversary of our incorporation just four years ago, in 2011. Lincoln Park was first formed as a village in 1921 with a population of several hundred inhabitants. It was just a quick four years later that the population had grown – exploded, really – to some 11,000 people and to a point where the residents of the young community saw the necessity to reincorporate as a City, which took place by election in January of 1925. The year **1925** is the period on which we will be focusing with exhibits and special programs here at the museum through the course of the coming year, including honoring our many longtime families and family run-businesses.

We will have further news on these events in our February newsletter, as well as through email and Facebook updates. Along with the city, 90th anniversaries will also be observed by our municipal Fire Department and the LP Exchange Club next year.

....and another Landmark Anniversary

In addition to the 90 years of city history we will be celebrating next year, we are taking time to mark another significant anniversary: Is it possible that it's been 50 years since the formation of the legendary rock group 'The MC5' here in Lincoln Park? For those too old to know, the MC5 were a group of teens mostly out of Lincoln Park High School who met in the early 60s and formed a group

that went through several early transitional stages before emerging as the classic hard-driving rock troupe that we remember today. Beginning in October 1966, the MC5 became the house band for Russ Gibb's Grande Ballroom concert venue in west Detroit through the late 60s and early 70s - and recorded their live debut album, "Kick Out the Jams" there. While the MC5 first made their mark locally, in Lincoln Park and downriver, and later as a major presence in the Detroit-Ann Arbor music scene, they were at the vanguard in cultivating an early alternative style along with Iggy and the Stooges that would later evolve into punk rock. 1970's "Back in the USA" is arguably one of rock's premier albums.

The MC5 have been rock music legends for over four decades, and we are excited to have an opportunity to recognize their contribution to the national music scene with a very special event and exhibit here in Lincoln Park next spring. To this end, we are looking for local folks who have MC5 material and memorabilia (some may be still on walls, some tucked away) that could be temporarily loaned to the museum for this exhibit [if you are able to help out with this project please contact curator Jeff Day, at 313-0386-3137, or by email lpmuseum@gmail.com.]

The Grande Ballroom's resident poster artist Gary Grimshaw - another Lincoln Park High student and '63 graduate - would create a stunning collection of psychedelic concert posters that are today considered among the best of the rock era.
