100 Years, plus 1 A Centennial Saturday October 1st

Solution the intention was to hold an appropriate community celebration for Lincoln Park's 100th birthday way back in 2021. The coronavirus pandemic - as it did for many things - forced a postponement. While we can all agree that distress and disappointment have plagued the past couple of years, there is definite relief that we can, again and with less risk, gather together under one roof. Which means that a centennial commemoration celebrating Lincoln Park's 101 year anniversary can now be held!

Please join us on **Saturday, October 1st**. The festivities will take place at Lincoln Park High School, 1701 Champaign Road. The celebration reception and program will be held in the Lincoln Park High School cafeteria at 6:30 p.m. Food and beverages will be on hand; a highlight of the evening will feature the presentation of special honors and recognitions; a slide show of early Lincoln Park history will be shared by museum curator Jeff Day, and live musical entertainment will be provided. Reservations are \$10 for members and \$12 for non-members. We hope that many of you can join us for the anniversary!

FREE FILM SCREENING

To extend the celebration of Lincoln Park's founding in 1921, a FREE showing of the classic silent film, **Charlie Chaplin's "The Kid"** released the same year will be held

in the Lincoln Park High School auditorium, also on Saturday, October 1, and prior to the evening program. The screening is offered to the public free of charge, no reservations are needed. Doors will open at 4:30p.m. with a **5:00 p.m. movie time**.

Guest parking is available in the rear/south lot of the school building with theater entrance off the



parking lot. An accessible entrance is at the school's front circle drive off of Champaign Rd.

"The Kid" is known for being Chaplin's first featurelength film, in his trademark role of the Tramp, and costars a six-year-old Jackie Coogan as The Kid. For the film's 50th anniversary, in 1971, Chaplin composed a musical score to accompany his 53-minute film. That is the version we will see and hear.

The free film screening is a separate event from the evening reception which does require advance reservations -- See article at left.

Please Note: Reservations for the 6:30 p.m. October 1st Centennial Anniversary program are due by Monday, September 26. Reservation forms are included in the member mailing along with your membership renewal envelopes and the current newsletter.

Little League Celebration held

For the 70th anniversary of Lincoln Park Little League this year, celebration events were recently held on August 20th. It was thrilling to have four of the original Lincoln Park players on hand, who played the first year 1953 (after the league was officially chartered here in 1952). Now barely octogenarians, Joe Charney, Don Oboza, Bill O'Donnell, and Ken Lavictoire were anxious to pick up bat, ball and glove and join the alumni ballgame held at Quandt Park. The game proved to be a multi-generational effort with real sportsmanship and camaraderie; several youngsters helped to give us enough players to put together the two teams. Mayor Tom Karnes served as the honorary game coach.

We are indebted to LP North President Dave Cruz for his support and offering the field and equipment for use. And, thanks to Dave, we also had an experienced umpire for the game!

In addition to those mentioned above, these former players also joined for a memorable fun game: Bill O'Donnell's younger brother John O'Donnell who started playing in '54, Holly Ivey-Couch, Nicholas Walls, Anthony Jesue, Ray Kuzminski, Alexandria Cruz, Jim Goodell, Rodney Ritter, Eric Anhut, Juston Gerbo, and the four youngsters, Cole Matteini, Nolan Gerbo, Jayden Anhut, and Ryker Karasinski. Others who showed for the alumni gathering include Virginia Mondon, a former coach and a Lincoln Park institution in her own right; players Larry Krueger, Billy Sims, Dan Addison, Larry Jesue, Sarah Perry, John Fields, Vic DeMaggio, Jim DeMaggio, and Andrew Dobrovalski. Andrew was the youngest alum, having played with LP North from 2020 to 2022.

The day's activities were well attended. The successful event has led to talk of making the Little League alumni game an annual affair, probably held earlier in the spring. More news to come.





ALIENS LAND IN LINCOLN PARK!



To celebrate Halloween this year, the museum will present a special screening of **"Invasion of the Saucer Men"** (1957), which features Lincoln Park native Lyn **"Buddy" Osborn** (1926-1957) in the role of Artie Burns - also the movie's narrator. (Lyn is the human being in the above advert.) "Buddy," who lived with his family on Lincoln Boulevard, was a 1943 graduate of Lincoln Park High School. After serving in the U.S. Navy during the war, he moved to Los Angeles to start his hoped-for acting career, studying at the Pasadena Playhouse.

Osborn is more popularly known for the role of "Cadet Happy" which he played for five years, from 1950 to 1955, on the tv and radio serial *Space Patrol.* Lyn's career was tragically cut short when he died at age 32 following emergency surgery for a brain tumor.

Doors open at 5:30 p.m. The movie is offered to the public FREE of charge and reservations are not needed. A short presentation on Lyn Osborn's life will also be shared. Donations are accepted and light refreshments will be available; no outside food or beverages, please.
